About Our School: Eden Elementary is home to Kindergarten through 5th grades and a Head Start Program. The school is located off Route #645 in the vicinity of Milo, Kentucky. Teachers and staff at Eden use a wide variety of teaching techniques and practices to ensure each student's success. Eden has been a Reading First school using the Success for All reading program. The goal is to have all students reading proficiently by the end of primary grades through the use of scientifically based reading research strategies. Eden met 11 out of 12 targets on the federal No Child Left Behind Act on the 2010 assessment. Eden's Family Resource Center enhances all students' ability to succeed in school by assisting children and families in meeting their basic needs. Eden has an active parent volunteer which enhances the schools commitment to program provide educational excellence. How We Ensure Educational Equity: All Eden Elementary students are offered а curriculum that is standards-based. challenging, and provides opportunities for reaching proficiency to ensure educational equity for all students regardless of race, gender, religion, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, or disabilities. Educational equity is supported through on-going staff training and the use of disaggregated data. Student performance is measured formally bv performance on the state assessment. Other types of assessment data collected and analyzed are performance on MAP. AIMSweb. STAR Reading, GRADE, and teacher-made tests. The counselor delivers core content related counseling services that address achievement, attendance, closing the achievement gap, and school success. The Family Resource Center, Counselor, and Title I work closely with staff, students, and parents to assist in removing barriers to learning. The CSIP is updated as applicable and equity for all students is integrated into each component

- School Improvement Yr 1 (2 years not making AYP): Notify parents, implement school choice, and write or revise school plan.
- School Improvement Yr 2 (3 years not making AYP): Notify parents, continue school choice, revise school plan, and offer supplemental services.

State Assistance (Non-Title I)

Senate Bill I, signed into law in March 2009, requires state accountability for Non-Title I schools. If a non-Title I school does not make AYP in the same content area for two consecutive years, the school will be eligible for state assistance. The description "Eligible for State Assistance" will appear in the Consequences, School Status column, followed by the number "1" or "2" indicating the number of years eligible.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky's Interim School Testing and Accountability System has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests (KCCT); readiness tests by grade level; and other measures of a school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. This interim system will be replaced in the 2011-12 school year by a new testing and accountability system structured as required by statute. The goal is that, by 2014, nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished in every subject area tested.

Procedures in Place In Our School for Drug and Weapons Detection:

A school safety plan outlining all safety procedures, including drug and weapon detection is in place. Other safety standards include the following procedures. Exterior doors remain locked except the door to the office area. Office personnel use a buzzer system to grant access for visitors to enter student areas. Visitors and volunteers wear nametags while in the building. Teachers and assistants are placed at duty stations throughout the day so students are under constant adult supervision. Staff has continuous access to the office via telephone and intercom system in every classroom. Drug abuse and prevention, violence prevention, and character education curriculum is implemented across grade levels. Reported violations are investigated.

How We Use Technology To Teach:

Integration of technology is essential for helping students achieve proficiency. All teachers use SMART Boards to teach research skills, deliver core content material, and engage students in interactive activities. Computers are available in the computer lab, library, classrooms, and a mobile computer lab. MAP and AIMSweb are used for assessment. Lexia Reading and Study Island prepare students for the KCCT. World Book Web is used for research-based activities. Also seven IPOD hubs (210 units) are utilized by classrooms. Each classroom is equipped with document cameras, IPADS, and airliners.

State Contest Results: State level contests are not available to Eden Elementary students.

Extracurricular Activities: Eden Elementary provides a variety of extracurricular activities for student participation and individual growth. Extracurricular activities include girls and boys basketball, track and field, cheerleading, academic team, and spelling team. Other activities available include Family Literacy Nights and Girl Scouts. Volleyball will be a new extracurricular activity available to the students. We presently have 41 students enrolled in the gifted and talented program.

Awards & Recognitions: On the 2010 KCCT state assessment, 196 students scored proficient and 64 scored distinguished in one or more content areas tested. Sixteen students placed in the district competition of the KAAC Governor's Cup as well as three students placing at the regional level.

What We Are Doing To Improve: Eden has been a Reading First School. All students receive reading and math instruction daily during a 60-90 minute block in addition to supplemental, intervention, and one on one tutoring as needed. ESS targets students with specific academic deficiencies. Teachers participate in professional learning communities to plan for the various teaching methods and strategies that are used to ensure the highest quality of learning in Martin County takes place at Eden.
